PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

On September 26th, AAUW along with the League of Women Voters hosted a presentation from RAASE who discussed Human Trafficking in the Rockford Area.

Illinois is 8th in the nation and Rockford is 2nd in Illinois. Obviously, this is a very serious issue for our area. So how did we get here and how did this happen is a question that my husband asked when he became aware of this issue. How did we not notice?

Thanks to our members who worked on this event, we have some answers.

It has always been here, but we as a community disregarded what was happening because we just thought it was willing prostitution by immoral or "fallen" women. Or we thought trafficking was just something that happened to women from foreign countries who were somehow complicit with their situation. We didn't understand what was really happening and so we did not care.

Thanks to Jennifer Cacciapaglia and Lori Johnson from RAASE, we now understand that the people that are being trafficked are girls and women from our own area as well as from foreign countries. They are not willing prostitutes but are instead people who have been tricked into trusting the person who is trafficking them and they are beaten or tortured if they try to leave. We now understand that they are victims that need our support to escape as well as our respect after they find freedom.

Thanks to the work done by all involved, Mayor McNamara is now forming a City Human Rights Commission which will not only deal with Human Trafficking but also Domestic Violence which accounts for over 25% of all crime in the Rockford Area.

To all our members who worked to bring these issues forward - Job Well Done!

KFACT – Keeping Families and Communities Together

Learn about local program aimed at helping girls finish high school, go to college

Shamika Williams, founder of Rockford-based Keeping Families and Communities Together, will discuss her program at the Nov. 9 general meeting of the Rockford Branch of AAUW.

KFACT serves more than 100 low-income girls annually in its Lady All Stars mentoring program. Its goal to to help young women finish high school and move on to college. So far, it has achieved a 98 percent retention rate of girls who start the program, and a 100 percent graduation rate of girls who remain in Lady All Stars.

Additionally, 92 percent of the girls have moved on to post-secondary education.

Williams, who was herself a teen mother, realized as she worked to get through college herself, that other girls are not aware of the opportunities available to them while they are still in high school.

Come meet Williams and two of the girls who are in her mentoring program at Tavern on Clark, Nov. 9. Dinner will be at 6 p.m., followed by William's program and a chat with her and the girls.

PUBLIC INFORMATION – FAYE MARCUS

My View column, Rockford Register Star - Monday, Oct. 9. 2017

On September 26, the American Association of University Women (AAUW) and League of Women Voters presented a very important program on Human Trafficking and its horrible affects in our community. Jennifer Cacciapaglia and Lori Johnson, co-founders of RAASE (Rockford Area Alliance Against Sexual Exploitation) presented an extremely interesting and sometimes shocking program on the issues associated with this problem. We were told that Rockford is #2 in the state with sexual trafficking and Illinois is #8 in the country. Those statistics are very alarming. Our goal for presenting this program was to educate the community about this devastating issue in our region. With over 100 people in attendance, we believe that we have begun to be successful in this endeavor.

AAUW's public policy includes this statement: "AAUW believes that global interdependence requires national and international policies against human trafficking..." (This includes local and state policies.)

What are the next steps:

- Rep. Litesa Wallace gave us information about bills that have been signed into law by Governor Rauner. They include:
 - o HB 270 which creates the Law Enforcement Sexual Assault Investigation Act.
 - SB1842 that expands the statute of limitations for survivors of human trafficking and exploitation to bring suit against their traffickers.
 - HB 1677 provides training for truck drivers to identify signs of trafficking at truck stops. Truck stops are often sites for sexual trafficking.
- Chief Judge McGraw provided us with information about how the Court and local law enforcement are working together to fight this issue in our area.

We are asking the public to continue to be aware, continue to be educated, and talk to others about this issue including our children and grandchildren. With so many being involved with social media, many of our young people are more vulnerable.
